Greetings to all our stakeholders, partners, and supporters.

As 2025 comes to a close, I extend sincere appreciation to our partners, staff, beneficiaries and all who walk this journey with us. Your trust in the African Capacity Building Foundation (ACBF) continues to drive our work and progress.

In a time marked by uncertainty and complex global changes, our work remains rooted in the belief that Africa's transformation relies on strong institutions and capable, empowered people. That conviction continues to guide every action, partnership, and program we undertake. This year, ACBF reinforced its focus on Africa-led solutions through capacity-building in public financial management, intra-African trade, climate resilience, agribusiness, and governance. We supported 10 civil society organizations, trained more than 2,600 officials across ministries, departments, agencies, NGOs, and the private sector, and equipped 50 small and medium-sized enterprises with skills and tools to access cross-border trade.

Together, we convened thousands of stakeholders, supported critical reforms, and contributed to the implementation of the African Union's Agenda 2063 and the Sustainable Development Goals. We stood with

member states and regional bodies to strengthen their voices, influence, and resilience, because capacity is the engine of sovereignty and progress.

In April, we hosted the first International Conference on Taxation of the Digital Economy in Dakar, Senegal, under the theme Strengthening Capacity for Effective Digital Taxation in Africa. The event brought together 560 participants from 26 countries and set a path for harmonizing digital tax policy across the continent. Several countries are now integrating these lessons into domestic resource mobilization strategies.

Our Uhora Academy expanded significantly this year, reaching over 1,200 participants from 50 countries through flagship e-learning courses on governance and digital taxation. We launched the Building Excellence in Taxation and Administration (BETA) Program to build practical skills in budgeting, expenditure tracking, taxation, and accountability, growing the platform's user base by 80 percent to more than 2,000 learners. Through targeted training, 87 senior officials from six countries strengthened their leadership and public finance management capabilities.

During the 11th Africa Think Tank Summit, held in October in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, we launched the Africa Think Tank Platform Project in partnership with the African Union Commission, funded by the World Bank Group. The US\$50 million initiative supports research and policy innovation. The summit also saw the launch of a new book, *Creation, Management and Sustainability of Think Tanks in Africa*, providing a strategic guide to strengthening African policy institutions.

Our 2024 Annual Report provides a comprehensive reflection of our efforts to strengthen human and institutional capacity across the continent. The report highlights ACBF's continued commitment to delivering meaningful results across four key impact areas, including climate change and energy for productive use; agribusiness and food sovereignty; trade as an engine of economic development; and economic and social governance.

In 2026, we will sharpen our focus on domestic resource mobilization, digital transformation, youth leadership, and inclusive development. With your continued support, ACBF will deepen its impact, expand its reach, and help shape a future led by African solutions. Let us move into 2026 with renewed unity, determination, and purpose.

IIIA: Advancing Legislative Advocacy for Public Health in Kenya



The International Institute for Legislative Affairs (IILA) is a not-for-profit organization based in Kenya that has been supporting government ministries, parliamentarians, civil society, and other stakeholders in the development and implementation of pro-people policies and legislation since 2005.

Through its focus on Health Governance, Tax Justice, and Natural Resource Governance, IILA works to strengthen legislative systems and promote evidence-based policy reform.

As a long-standing partner of ACBF, IILA has significantly expanded its reach and impact across the tobacco control space. With targeted capacity development support, the organization has trained staff, empowered youth advocates, and built technical expertise in countering tobacco industry interference.

"Through the support from ACBF, the International Institute for Legislative Affairs (IILA) is implementing high-impact initiatives to enhance tobacco control coordination, evidence generation, and policy resilience in Kenya," said Celina Awuor, CEO of IILA.

"IILA is collaborating with the Ministry of Health Division of Drugs and Substance Abuse (DDSAC) to strengthen national tobacco control policy programming and implementation, through which an end-term review of the National Tobacco Control Strategic Plan (NTCSP) 2019–2023 has been conducted. This process has generated actionable evidence to inform the next planning cycle," she added.

To strengthen tobacco industry monitoring and response efforts, IILA has also enhanced coordination, evidence generation, and public engagement through the Tobacco Industry Monitoring and Response (TIMR) advocacy.

IILA convenes quarterly TIMR meetings, fostering collaboration, data sharing, and timely response to emerging industry interference. These efforts are improving the coordination and responsiveness of the TIMR Team, strengthening evidence on digital marketing and policy evasion strategies, and increasing public and stakeholder engagement in countering tobacco industry interference, thereby reinforcing Kenya's policy implementation and enforcement capacity.

IILA continues to play a vital role in public health advocacy and legislative accountability in Kenya. Its grassroots and institutional efforts are helping to foster a more informed, empowered, and health-conscious society.

ACBF in Action

11th Africa Think Tank Summit Champions Policy Innovation and Fiscal Sovereignty



Held from 8 to 10 October 2025 in Addis Ababa, the 11th Africa Think Tank Summit brought together leading minds and institutions to shape Africa's development trajectory. The event was convened by the African Capacity Building Foundation (ACBF) in partnership with the African Union Commission (AUC) and the Government of Ethiopia.

It was supported by the World Bank and the Hewlett Foundation, with technical collaboration from the African Leadership Excellence Academy (AFLEX), the Policy Studies Institute (PSI), and the Africa-Europe Foundation.

As the continent's flagship platform for policy dialogue and knowledge exchange, the Summit built on its tradition of promoting evidence-informed policymaking and strengthening African institutions. Since its launch in 2014, ATTS has fostered collaboration among think tanks, governments, and development partners.

The 2025 edition focused on reinforcing fiscal sovereignty, improving domestic resource mobilization, and advancing transparent and accountable governance. Over three days, participants engaged in 24 sessions that included high-level plenaries, stakeholder forums, side events, and a dedicated training on public financial management.

Notable launches included the Book on African Think Tanks, the Africa Export Competitiveness Report 2024, and a new online course on "Taxing the Digital Economy" offered through [ACBF Uboru Academy - For Learning and Knowledge-Sharing](#)

By bridging knowledge and action, the Summit reinforced ACBF's mission to support capable, inclusive, and sustainable institutions driving Africa's economic and governance transformation.

CADAST Empowers Civil Society for AfCFTA Implementation Across 10 Countries



Twenty civil society leaders, including women- and youth-led organizations, completed an intensive training program under the Capacity Development for Africa's Structural Transformation (CADAST) initiative.

Organized by the African Capacity Building Foundation (ACBF) with support from the African Development Bank, the workshop was held from October 13 to 17 at the ESAMI-TRAPCA campus in Arusha, Tanzania.

The training combined expert-led technical sessions with site visits and strategy development. It aimed to equip participants with the tools to drive grassroots implementation of the African Continental Free Trade Area (AfCFTA). Delivered in partnership with the Trade Policy Training Centre in Africa (TRAPCA), the workshop offered practical guidance on trade policy, stakeholder engagement, opportunity mapping, and results-oriented action planning.

Participants from ten countries, Benin, Burundi, Comoros, the Democratic Republic of Congo, Ghana, Malawi, Rwanda, Sierra Leone, Togo, and Zimbabwe, developed national action plans, monitoring frameworks, and step-down training strategies. Each participant committed to replicating the knowledge within their networks over the next 60 days, helping extend the program's impact across communities.

The CADAST initiative continues to position civil society as a key factor in advancing AfCFTA priorities and ensuring inclusive, locally led economic transformation.

ACBF Showcases Impact of Institutional Capacity Building for Tobacco Control at COP11



Held from 8 to 10 October 2025 in Addis Ababa, the 11th Africa Think Tank Summit brought together leading minds and institutions to shape Africa's development trajectory. The event was convened by the African Capacity Building Foundation (ACBF) in partnership with the African Union Commission (AUC) and the Government of Ethiopia.

On November 20, ACBF hosted a side event titled “Strengthening institutional capacity for sustainable tobacco control in Africa” during COP11 in Geneva, Switzerland. The session focused on how targeted investments have helped civil society organizations and knowledge hubs evolve into more vigorous advocates for tobacco control across the continent.

Participants shared practical examples of how this support has enhanced internal systems, deepened policy engagement, and improved program implementation.

Speakers highlighted the role of capable institutions in driving evidence-based advocacy, engaging policymakers, increasing public awareness, and countering tobacco industry interference. These efforts are contributing to the stronger implementation of the WHO Framework Convention on Tobacco Control in several African countries.

CADAST Assessment Workshop in Togo Enhances Trade Monitoring Frameworks



As part of its CADAST initiative, the African Capacity Building Foundation (ACBF) is supporting countries to strengthen institutional capacity for intra-African trade. On 20 November 2025, ACBF hosted a national workshop in Lomé, Togo, to validate the findings of a capacity assessment on monitoring and reporting mechanisms for the African Continental Free Trade Area (AfCFTA).

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The Togo assessment was conducted under a harmonized framework across five countries. It revealed that while Togo has taken steps, such as developing a national AfCFTA strategy and creating a technical committee, significant challenges remain. These include weak coordination between structures, limited resources, and the absence of a structured results measurement framework specific to AfCFTA.

The one-day workshop brought together 30 representatives from government, private sector, academia, and development partners. Participants reviewed the draft report, aligned on key recommendations, and charted a roadmap to strengthen data systems, accountability structures, and institutional readiness for AfCFTA implementation.

The CADAST project, implemented by ACBF in partnership with the African Development Bank, supports African countries in building resilient macroeconomic governance, advancing regional integration, and accelerating Agenda 2063 through targeted capacity development.

ACBF Launches Africa Export Competitiveness Report in Zimbabwe



On 28 November 2025, ACBF convened a high-level policy dialogue in Harare to launch the *Africa Export Competitiveness (AEC) Report 2024* and engage stakeholders on strategies to boost Zimbabwe's industrial and trade performance.

Co-produced by ACBF, Shared Value Africa, and the Institute for Competitiveness India, the report offers a comparative analysis of export performance across African economies and highlights policy options for inclusive growth under the AfCFTA.

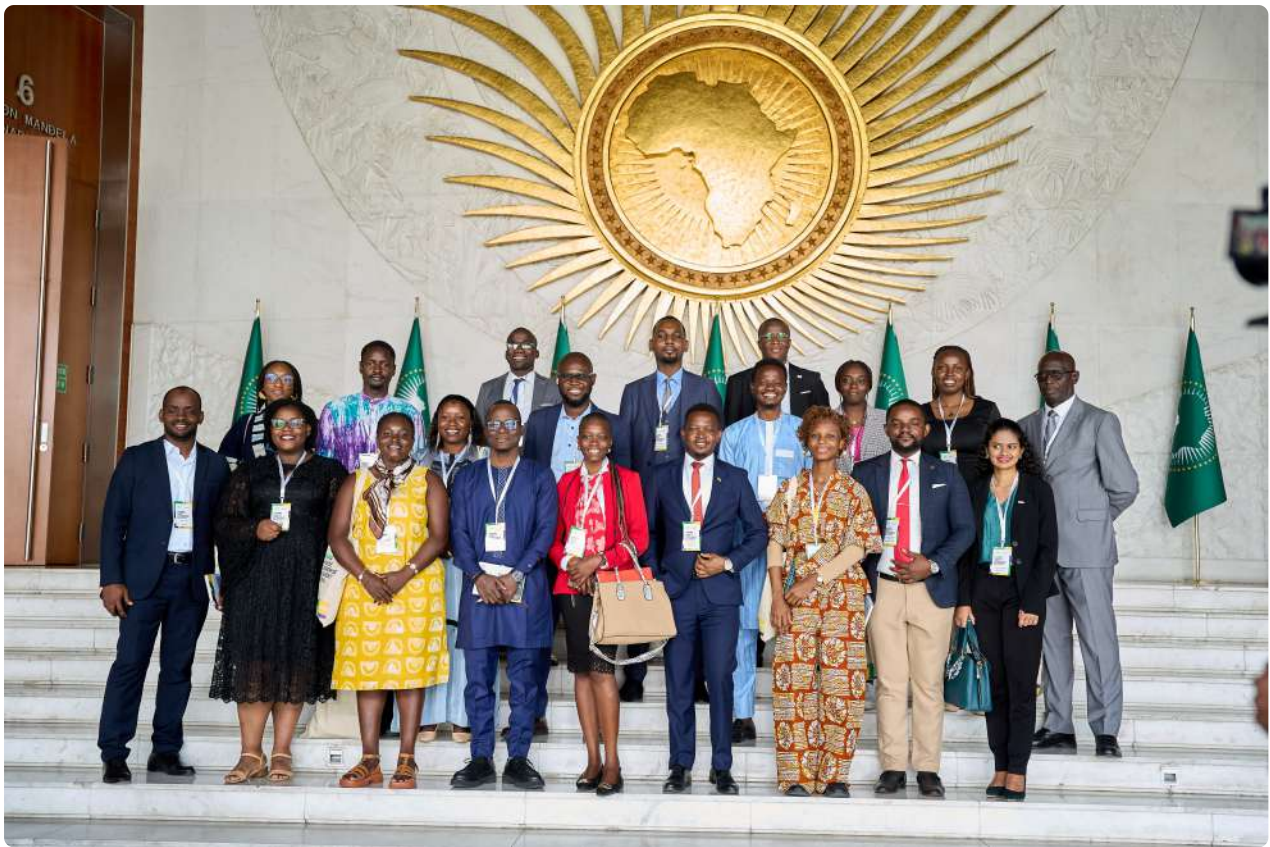
The launch brought together senior policymakers, private sector leaders, and development partners for a candid exchange on Zimbabwe's current export landscape. Key speakers included Sekai Kuvarika, CEO of the Confederation of Zimbabwe Industries (CZI), and

Dr. Amit Kapoor, report co-author, shared data-driven insights into regional trends and Zimbabwe's relative positioning.

Panelists from ZimTrade, the Zimbabwe National Chamber of Commerce, and the Competition and Tariff Commission discussed structural challenges, including limited product diversification, regulatory hurdles, and the need to modernize trade infrastructure. They also explored the country's untapped strengths, such as its entrepreneurial base and industrial potential in key value chains.

Participants underscored the importance of gender inclusion, youth engagement, and cross-sector collaboration in driving export-led growth. The initiative reaffirmed ACBF's commitment to promoting evidence-based policymaking and equipping African countries with the tools to compete, scale, and integrate effectively into global markets.

Second Cohort of Francophone Youth Trained in Multilateral Entrepreneurship



From 26 to 28 November 2025, ACBF and the Organisation Internationale de la Francophonie (OIF) hosted the second cohort of the "Enterprise Mindset in a Multilateral Environment" training clinic in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia.

The program equipped 18 young francophone professionals from 18 countries with key skills to navigate international organizations, lead projects, and drive innovation across diverse institutional contexts.

The three-day clinic combined experiential learning, institutional immersion, and expert mentorship. Participants engaged in sessions on leadership, project design, intercultural communication, diplomacy, and ethical entrepreneurship. They also visited the African Union Commission and UNECA Headquarters and had an interactive session with a group of ambassadors to experience first-hand the workings of multilateral systems.

The initiative forms part of the ACBF–OIF strategic partnership to build the next generation of francophone African leaders ready to shape regional and global agendas. Participants left with tailored project pitches and strengthened networks to support their professional and civic engagement in multilateral spaces.

Thought Leadership and Collaboration

Using Data to Shape Policy and Drive Reform in Africa's Landlocked Countries

At the "From Data to Policy" session of a national workshop on trade and transport costs in Landlocked Developing Countries (LLDCs), ACBF joined leading institutions to explore how data can shape policy priorities and infrastructure decisions. Held on November 6, the second day of the workshop, the session focused on turning evidence into actionable strategies to strengthen trade corridors, facilitate reforms, and drive economic integration.

Panelists presented concrete examples of how data has informed decision-making across Africa, while also addressing challenges such as data gaps, limited institutional capacity, and access to real-time information. They underscored that reliable data, when linked to institutional ownership and cross-sector collaboration, can unlock smarter investments and more responsive trade policies.

The session reaffirmed the need to scale up data-driven policymaking across LLDCs, ensuring that transport and trade strategies are grounded in local realities and aligned with broader development goals such as the African Continental Free Trade Area (AfCFTA) and Agenda 2063.

ACBF Gains Observer Status at MOP4, Reinforces Role in Global Tobacco Governance

The African Capacity Building Foundation (ACBF) was officially approved as an observer to the Protocol to Eliminate Illicit Trade in Tobacco Products during the Fourth Meeting of the Parties (MOP4), held from 24 to 26 November 2025 in Geneva. This recognition strengthens ACBF's ability to support African countries in tackling illicit tobacco trade and contribute to global discussions on public health and fiscal governance.

The observer status builds on ACBF's long-standing commitment to strengthening institutional capacity for tobacco control. It allows the Foundation to bring African perspectives to the global stage, support cross-border cooperation, and help shape international frameworks that impact domestic revenue mobilization and health policy.

The decision came amid growing calls for tougher enforcement, transparency, and collaboration. ACBF's engagement will help amplify the continent's voice in treaty implementation and support data-driven responses to tobacco illicit trade.

Reimagining Philanthropy's Role in Domestic Resource Mobilization

On 26 November 2025, ACBF Executive Secretary Mamadou Biteye joined a high-level panel during the 3rd African Philanthropy Day in Paris to explore how philanthropy can support Africa's domestic resource mobilization efforts. The discussion focused on building trust in public finance, aligning fiscal strategies with local priorities, and strengthening national systems.

The session, held at the OECD headquarters, featured voices from the ONE Campaign, GK Partners, ACBF, and the Africa-Europe Foundation. Mr. Biteye called for philanthropic actors to go beyond short-term interventions and invest in the long-term institutional capacity that enables countries to raise and manage their own resources effectively.

Speakers shared practical examples such as diaspora financing platforms, digital tax tools, and transparency measures that promote local ownership and reduce aid dependency. The panel underscored the need for collaborative approaches that shift philanthropy toward enabling systems that are inclusive, accountable, and locally anchored.

This dialogue builds on ACBF's commitment to advancing fiscal sovereignty and strengthening the policy and institutional foundations for sustainable development across Africa.

ACBF Joins Global Industrial Policy Dialogue at UNIDO GC21 in Riyadh

From 23 to 27 November 2025, the African Capacity Building Foundation participated in the twenty-first session of the UNIDO General Conference, held in Riyadh, Saudi Arabia. The global gathering brought together ministers, development experts, and institutional leaders to explore pathways toward inclusive and sustainable industrial development.

As Africa's premier institution for capacity building, ACBF seized the opportunity to engage in high-level conversations on strengthening the continent's institutional readiness for green industrialisation, digital transformation, and the expansion of industrial value chains. The Foundation also highlighted the need to align industrial development policies with capacity priorities under Agenda 2063 and the Sustainable Development Goals.

ACBF's participation reaffirmed its commitment to ensuring that Africa's voice is included in shaping global development frameworks and that institutional capacity is placed at the heart of industrial strategies.

ACBF Contributes to Dialogue on Capacity Building and Scientific Sovereignty in Chad

On December 1, 2025, ACBF participated in the inaugural meeting, "Capacity Building in Africa: Tools, Challenges and Convergences," in N'Djamena, Chad. Organized by the French National Research Institute for Sustainable Development (IRD) and the Francophone University Agency (AUF), the event brought together researchers, academics, and representatives from African institutions and international organizations.

ACBF contributed to the opening session, focusing on capacity building as a catalyst for development and scientific sovereignty in Africa, emphasizing the importance of developing local capacities to ensure autonomous, sustainable development across African countries.

The Foundation also participated in Panel 1, sharing practical insights on existing capacity-building tools, innovative approaches, and effective partnerships that have delivered concrete results through institutional support programs, individual training, and international mobility initiatives.

The dialogue reinforced ACBF's commitment to strengthening Africa's research and academic ecosystem as a foundation for long-term development and knowledge-based transformation.

ACBF Joins Global Dialogue on Financial Innovation at SupTech Week 2025

Mamadou Biteye, Executive Secretary of the African Capacity Building Foundation, joined global regulators, innovators, and thought leaders at SupTech Week 2025, held from 8 to 12 December in New York.

Hosted by the Cambridge SupTech Lab in collaboration with the World Economic Forum, the event focuses on scaling digital tools for smarter, more inclusive financial supervision.

Through peer roundtables, policy dialogues, and showcases, SupTech Week explores how supervisory technologies can drive resilience, accountability, and cross-border innovation. ACBF's participation reflects its commitment to digital transformation as a pillar of institutional capacity and sustainable development.

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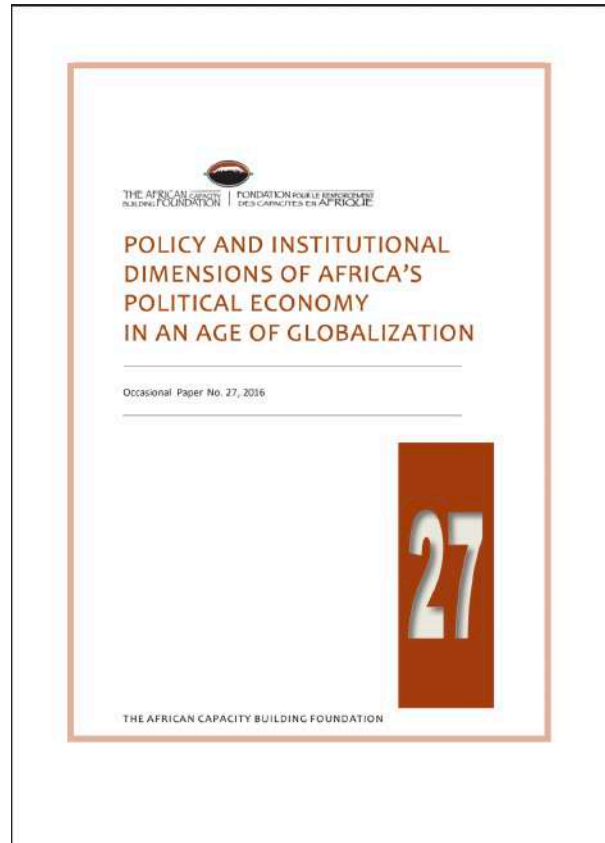

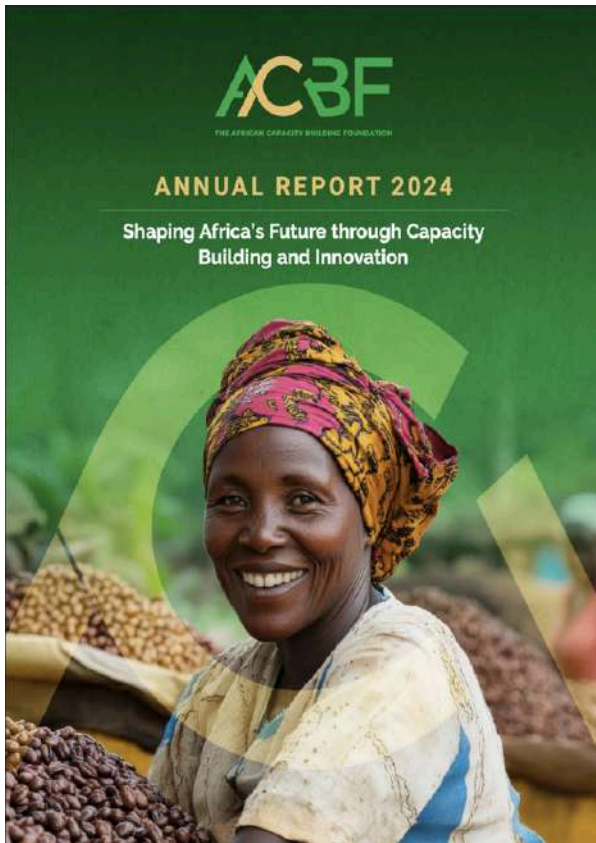
ACBF is pleased to announce the release of our new publication, *SME Guide – Unlocking Cash Flow for SMEs: Factoring as a Finance Solution* (Policy Brief, October 2025), which provides practical insights to help African enterprises overcome one of their most significant challenges – access to affordable working capital. The guide explains how factoring can transform unpaid invoices into immediate cash, enabling SMEs to improve liquidity, meet payroll, pay suppliers, and confidently accept new orders, especially when dealing with large buyers or cross-border clients where payment delays are common. Despite its widespread global use, factoring remains underutilized in Africa due to low awareness, legal gaps, and market concentration. Yet, emerging digital solutions and the expanding AfCFTA marketplace present powerful growth opportunities. The publication highlights how SMEs can become “factor-ready,” outlines the steps to access factoring or supplier finance, and points to regional institutions offering support. As Africa’s trade landscape evolves – supported by systems like PAPSS and an increase in open-account transactions – this guide serves

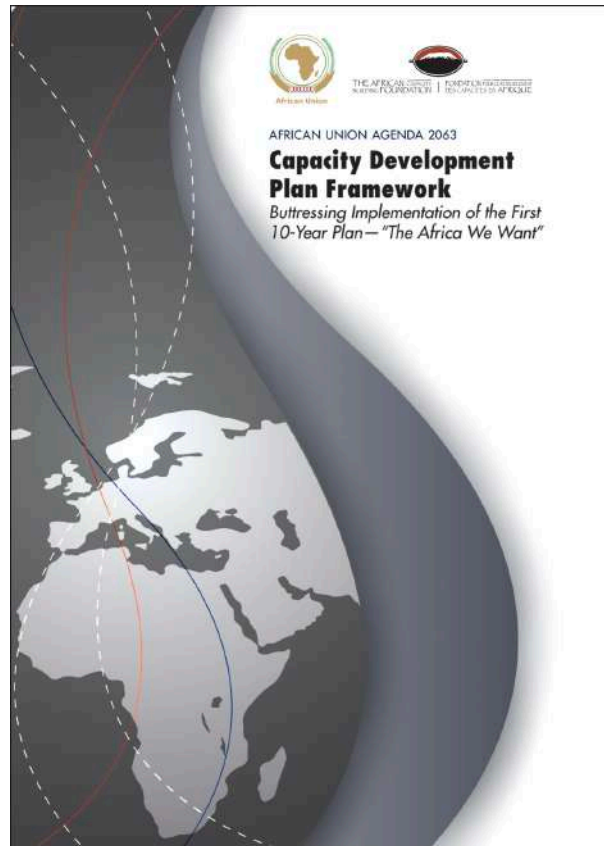
As part of our commitment to balancing timeless knowledge with cutting-edge insights, we are pleased to bring back this widely requested publication. The paper revisits one of ACBF’s most influential analyses on how African countries have navigated globalisation, examining why some nations achieved sustained growth while others remained trapped in cycles of instability, inequality, and weak institutions. It highlights the critical role of macroeconomic policy, governance, and the “developmental state,” drawing lessons from Sub-Saharan Africa and high-growth regions such as Southeast Asia. With rich case studies—ranging from Botswana’s success to the challenges faced by countries like Zimbabwe and the DRC—the paper underscores that Africa’s economic renaissance is possible when policies and institutions are aligned with national realities. Revived by popular demand, this publication offers enduring insights that remain relevant today as Africa continues its journey toward inclusive

as a timely resource to help SMEs leverage receivables finance, strengthen their competitiveness, and unlock new pathways for growth.



We are delighted to present the ACBF Annual Report 2024, *Shaping Africa's Future through Capacity Building and Innovation*, a comprehensive reflection on two years of transformation, renewed vision, and strengthened action across the continent. The report captures ACBF's bold strides under the 2023–2027 Strategic Plan, highlighting progress across its four impact areas—Climate Change and Energy for Productive Use, Agribusiness and Food Sovereignty, Trade as a Driver of Economic Development, and Economic and Social Governance—while showcasing the Foundation's evolution from a grant-making institution to a dynamic capacity-building leader through its Institutional Accelerator Model, Knowledge Management Hub, and African Capacity Building Academy. With over US\$60 million invested in 12 high-impact programs supported by 10 development partners, ACBF has strengthened public institutions, empowered women and youth, expanded partnerships, and enhanced Africa's leadership and governance ecosystem. The report also highlights major milestones, including the launch of UBORA Academy, the rollout of flagship programs such as ELG-PFM and CADAST, and the publication of the first Africa Export Competitiveness Report, all achieved despite funding challenges and global shocks. As ACBF prepares for the mid-term review of its Strategy, the Annual Report

growth, structural transformation, and strengthened state capacity under Agenda 2063.



As we move toward 2026, this moment presents a significant opportunity to revisit one of ACBF's most forward-looking and foundational works—African Union Agenda 2063: Capacity Development Plan Framework, Which Buttresses the Implementation of the First 10-Year Plan, published in 2016, almost exactly a decade later. The publication was produced at a critical moment when Africa had just adopted Agenda 2063 and urgently needed to understand the capacities required to turn its 50-year vision into action. It outlined a bold, multilevel, and multistakeholder capacity development model anchored in African ownership, mindset transformation, skills development, institutional strengthening, and the emergence of a new generation of African change agents. The framework identified the essential capacity dimensions—ranging from critical technical skills and STEM education to improved governance systems, capacity retention, and an enabling political economy—that would drive implementation of the First 10-Year Plan (2014–2023). It emphasised that 80 per cent of required interventions could be delivered at national and stakeholder levels, calling on governments, youth, women, academia, regional bodies, and the private sector to invest in their own capacity ecosystems while continental institutions focused on coordination, advocacy, and confidence-building. Nearly 10

underscores lessons learned, a renewed call for an Endowment Fund for Capacity Building in Africa, and a strong commitment from the new Executive Board to deepen impact, expand reach, and position ACBF as the trusted partner driving Africa's journey toward resilience, self-reliance, and sustainable transformation.

years later, this publication stands as both a reminder of Africa's early ambitions under Agenda 2063 and a benchmark for evaluating how far the continent has progressed in building the skills, systems, institutions, and mindsets needed to achieve "The Africa We Want."

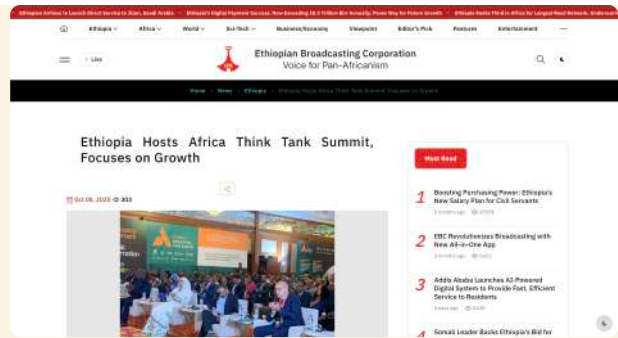
